*When all the people were being baptized, Jesus was baptized too. While he was praying, heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily form, like a dove. A voice came from heaven: “You are my Son, whom I love. I am well pleased with you.”*

*Luke 3:21-22*

As the season of Christmas winds down and the calendar year ends, the Church Year still continues on. After the season of Christmas, we go through the season of Epiphany until Lent begins. For this month's newsletter, I wanted to give a brief introduction to the season of Epiphany, as well as to teach about what to expect during Epiphany.

**Origin:** The season of Epiphany is one of the oldest seasons that is observed in the Church Year. The only one older than it? Easter. Epiphany begins on January 6<sup>th</sup>, and it seems that the date has its origins in a pagan festival that celebrated the birth of Aeon. Back in the first century, the church replaced this festival with a celebration about the baptism and birth of Jesus.

**Name and Themes:** The word “Epiphany” means “manifestation” in Greek. This season focuses on Jesus’ manifestation as true God and true man. You see this with the inclusion of texts like the baptism of Jesus and the Transfiguration, which really proclaim that truth. Texts about Jesus’ miracles are also common in this season (like his first miracle at the wedding at Cana), and they bear witness to his identity as God. Another theme in this season is light, and it is often reflected in the hymns. As the season progresses along, the readings typically switch the teachings that are found in the earlier parts of Jesus’ ministry.

**Color:** The color for the season of Epiphany is green. (The first Sunday is white as it marks the Baptism of Jesus.) Green often depicts growth and fulfillment. Green is also used during the season of Pentecost (which is the longest season of the Church Year). The idea of the color green being used can lead credence to the idea that Jesus is the fulfillment of Scripture, and that the prophecies about him, his work, and his coming are being fulfilled.

**Length:** The season of Epiphany can vary in length. This year, it will be six Sundays long, and can include as many as nine Sundays depending on the year. What effects the end date? When Easter occurs.

As we begin the season of Epiphany, I hope this little article will bless your understanding of the season and add to your appreciation of it. See that Jesus is true God and true man who came to save you and all from sin’s condemnation to hell.

# Christmas for Kids 2025

Christmas for Kids occurred on the morning of December 6<sup>th</sup> and was an exciting time for the kids and the volunteers involved. The theme was “The Shepherds Visit Baby Jesus” where the kids went with the shepherds to find out the true meaning of Christmas -- that Jesus, the Son of God, came down to earth to be our Savior from sin.



The morning focused on learning about the birth of Jesus and the related events. Our event included a Bible story time, crafts tied to CHRISTmas, fun snack time, and multiple music sessions with festive hymns focusing on Jesus’ birth. The day concluded with most families participating in a hot dog social that provided additional time to visit with each family.

Twenty kids from thirteen families were registered for the event. Seventeen kids from ten families were able to attend. The morning served six Calvary families, three sister member families, and one non-member family. Families were invited to join us for church the following day and nine kids were able to sing the hymn they learned, “Away in a Manger”.

**This was a Calvary family effort!!** We had 22 plus volunteers participate in helping the event be a success including 19+ adults helping during the day of the event. It was a fun and uplifting morning centered on the Christ child during time that is often over commercialized and “too busy” for Jesus...

## Stewardship of “New”

***The one who was seated on the throne said to me, “Look, I am making everything new. He also said, ‘Write, for these words are trustworthy and true’*** (Revelation 21:5).

In January there is a great deal of “new” talk. Parties are held to ring in the “new” year. “New” year’s resolutions are made to set a “new” course of life in the “new” year. There is date forgetfulness as checks and other forms are filled out without using the “new” year on the dateline.

We use all this “new” talk because there is very often so much wrong with the old in us. We think back to the “new” resolutions from the previous year that only lasted a few weeks. That “new” person did not shed any pounds and instead, picked up a few. The “new” habits of going to the gym were soon replaced by even more time on the couch binging on Netflix. The “new” person who does not lose their temper, use sarcasm as a lethal weapon and spend more money than necessary, but who worships, prays and serves the Lord and the neighbor, never seemed to stick around. We need “new” talk because the Old Adam is alive and well within every one of us.

But this promise of “new” is a matter of stewardship. It is the Lord himself who makes the promise of all things being new. These words recorded by John are not pious wishes or hopeless promises. They do what they say. YOU, that one baptized into Jesus’ death and resurrection, are NEW! These words are indeed trustworthy and true. This “new” comes to you in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It comes free of charge, even without our prayer.

This stewardship of “new” is not a vague, someday kind of stewardship either. You are NEW now! Forgiven. Reborn from above. The old is gone, nailed to Calvary’s cross and buried and rotting in a tomb that was only borrowed by Jesus for his resurrection rest. The Gospel is what makes us NEW every morning. Remembering your baptism, you are new. Confessing your sins and receiving absolution makes you new. Hearing the Gospel filling your ears makes you new. Feasting on Christ’s body and blood in the Holy Supper makes you new.

These mercies, totally undeserved as they are, are entrusted to us to steward TODAY even as we long for the Last Day. But we know how often we fail in this stewardship. We hoard God’s creation as if it belongs to us. We belittle and devalue our neighbor because they look or sound or act in a way that we do not like. We seek to make the Holy Word of God softer and more palatable for those, or even ourselves, who refuse to confess sin as sin and repent. We value our comfort over truth, our reputation over faithfulness and our treasure over making sure that people get to hear of the Jesus who has done so much for the world and us.

We, as stewards of the Gospel, need to be made new every day. This is exactly what the Lord does. We failed in stewardship of the Gospel last year, so he gives us a new year. We failed in stewardship of the Gospel yesterday, and he gives us a new day. We failed in stewardship of the Gospel in the last few minutes, and yet in mercy our newness comes with each tick of the clock! Because that is how the Lord works.

As we see this working of all new things in us, it then calls us to be stewards of this newness to the world. This starts right in our own homes. It radiates out to our neighbors. It beams out from our congregations. Your new talk starts in the newness of the Gospel. Steward this treasure in this new year and this new day. It starts with a new you in Jesus. This is indeed trustworthy and true.
